ST MARY'S COLLEGE CODE OF CONDUCT FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

The Student Code of Conduct which is published in the student diary is a condition of entry into St Mary's College stating the underlying principles that **students show respect for others and do quality work**. These include the expectation that students respect staff, other students, property, the school uniform and that they attend school each day and all classes punctually. They must be equipped for all lessons, do quality work and the homework set in each subject and always behave responsibly when representing the school.

Student Code of Conduct

Classroom rules: a) Show respect for others b) Do quality work

International students, whilst enrolled at St Mary's College, are not permitted to drink alcohol, smoke cigarettes including e-cigarettes, own or drive motorcars or motorcycles.

I will work to the best of my ability.

I will respect the right of others to learn.

I will respect the person and property of every other member of the school community.

I will care for the school environment.

I will show courtesy and respect towards all staff and I will meet all their requirements in and out of the classroom.

I will arrive at school on time and attend all classes punctually.

I will wear my school uniform correctly and tidily with pride.

I will be properly equipped for all lessons and do the homework set in each subject.

I will not bring into the school grounds or buildings: alcohol, drugs, offensive or dangerous weapons, cigarettes including e-cigarettes, lighters or matches or use them on any school occasion, or at any time when I am wearing my school uniform.

I will behave responsibly when representing the school and will obey the rules set for school teams and functions.

I will travel to and from school by the most direct route without stopping unnecessarily.

I will be courteous and helpful to school visitors and to members of the public on the street and in public transport.

I will not bring gum to school and I will not chew gum while at school.

Personal property such as cell phones are not to be used or seen during class. They can only be seen with the teacher's permission. If they are confiscated, they will only be returned to a Parent/Caregiver of the student during school hours.

I will obtain permission from the school before I drive a motor vehicle to school.

I will take responsibility for my personal property.

I will keep my passwords private and confidential.

Parent/Caregivers are reminded that the enrolment form is a legal document and that a condition of enrolment is that the student is fully prepared to abide by the rules of the school.

PASTORAL

The Pastoral Care team is led by Elena Grant, Deputy Principal and includes Deans, Learning Support, Counsellors, Careers Advisors and the School Nurse.

In the Mercy Tradition 'love in action' is a key to the conduct and discipline expected at St Mary's College. Through affirmation of positive qualities of each student we aim to produce articulate, vibrant, confident, self-disciplined and motivated Christian women with strong leadership qualities.

The Guidance Network in the College works to ensure the care and welfare of all our students. Although all teachers in the school contribute to the well-being of students, members of the Guidance Network have particular responsibility in this area.

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES

A Peer Support Programme is in place to assist students to make the transition to College a positive and enjoyable experience. In Term 1, Year 13 leaders are placed with Year 7 and Year 9 Form Classes and each week participate in a series of games and activities to promote social skills.

Peer Tutors - A number of Year 12 and 13 students are available as mentors for younger students to assist with their learning.

We discourage appointments during school time.

However, should one have to be made we require a note from Parent/Caregiver please email attendance@stmaryak.school.nz and copy in your Year Level Dean. A leave pass will be issued. Students must sign out at the office before leaving school. Students who are in Year 7 & 8 must be collected by a parent or adult named in the note.

Report to the school nurse between 9.30am-3.10pm, Monday-Friday. If it is before this time parents will be called to collect their daughter. You will need to get a nurse pass from your teacher before leaving class. The nurse will assess you and will contact parents if needed.

Go to the school nurse between 9.00am and 3.10pm. Outside these times go to the school office. For 3 days or less a letter/email needs to be submitted to your daughter's Dean. For more than 3 days a letter addressed to the Principal and your daughter's Dean. When leave is granted a letter will be emailed to you.

On occasion a student may have a good reason for not wearing part of the school uniform. A note must be brought from home to the student's Dean and a pass will be issued for the day. However, it is unacceptable for any student to continually apply for a uniform pass. Deans will contact parents if a uniform problem persists





CODE OF PRACTICE AND RESOLVING GRIEVANCES OR COMPLAINTS

When a student comes to New Zealand to study as an international student, education providers have a responsibility to ensure that they are well informed, safe and properly cared for. In New Zealand this is called 'pastoral care' and to support this, the New Zealand government has developed the Education (Pastoral Care of International Students) Code of Practice 2016.

In 1 July 2016 there were significant changes to the Code of Practice and a new dispute resolution scheme. Both these documents regulate the care and support of your daughter or student you are representing whilst she is studying at St Mary's College.

Please be assured that St Mary's College upholds and supports the Code of Practice, however, if for any reason you have concerns about your daughter's/student's treatment by the school or by one of the school's agent's your first step is to talk to the school's International Director, Mrs Sue King, (sking@stmaryak.school.nz) and if your concerns are not resolved by the school you can contact the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA), who will process your complaint through the DRS scheme. The website address is above or, for more information on the complaint process, you can contact NZQA on 0800 697 296.

OTHER USEFUL INFORMATION

Activity Fee

Students pay \$250.00 towards school related activities throughout the year. This can be used for activities during school time or after school which the international department organises from time to time. Any unused activity fee will be refunded when the student leaves the school.

Term Holidays

Each term the International Student Director will ask each International Student for written advice of their holiday arrangements. The student's Parent/guardian must sign this and return before the end of the term. No leave is to be taken out of term unless with the principal's permission.

Library

The library is open from 8.00am to 4.30pm every day.

Extra English tuition

If your Dean recommends that you need extra support in English, then your parents will be notified and the fee for the lessons invoiced.

Lockers

Year 7-8 students are automatically allocated a locker and they are informed of their locker location and number during the first week of school.

Year 9-13 students can purchase a locker for \$10.00. This can be paid through OfficeMax Myschool. Lockers can also be requested by contacting the accounts office accounts@stmaryak.school.nz Once payment is received your locker number can be found through the Parent Portal.

Lockers are randomly allocated; we do not swap lockers unless there is a very good reason to do so and this will need to be discussed with the Year level Dean. Padlocks are not supplied and will need to be purchased yourselves.

Phones

If students choose to bring a cell phone to school, it is the responsibility of each student to ensure the security of these during school hours. We discourage use during break times and use in class is at the professional discretion of the teacher for curriculum related use. We recommend Year 7 students do not bring Smartphones and parents do not provide data.

Photocopying Card

The issued student ID card is also the student photocopy card. Money can be loaded onto the ID card by using the "top up machine" located just outside the Library entrance. Please note it is coin only and the office do not supply change. There are instructions near the machine on how to use it and the school librarian is also there to help if needed.

We have a device programme for Year 8 to Year 13 students. The students are asked to purchase specific devices. Information will be given out towards the end of each year. A meeting regarding BYOD at St Mary's College will be held and information will be published in the school newsletter.

Students are required to sign the Cyber Safety policy which states the procedures that they need to consistently follow to be a good digital citizen of St Mary's College.

SCHOOL ROAD SAFETY AWARENESS

Religious Education, English/English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Health and Physical Education, Arts (including Music, Art, Drama), Technology (three trimester courses of Technology, Design & Visual Communication, Digital Technologies and Fashion & Interior Design)

AND 1 Language from French, Chinese and Te Reo Māori (numbers permitting)

All Year 10 students will study the following compulsory subjects:

Religious Education, English/English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Health and Physical Education

Art, Business Studies, Chinese, Dance, Design and Visual Communication, Digital Technology, Drama, Fashion & Interior Design, French, Health Science, Music, Te Reo Māori

Year 11, 12 and 13

All Year 11 students will study the following compulsory subjects:

Religious Education and one Mathematics Course (Mathematics or General Mathematics), English, and Science Course (Science, 20 credits or Science, 16 credits) *AND* three other subjects of their choice.

All Year 12 students will study the following compulsory subjects:

Religious Education and an English Course **AND** five other subjects of their choice.

All Year 13 students will study Religious Education **AND** five other subjects of their choice.

MUSIC

ST MARY'S COLLEGE MUSIC PROGRAMME

St Mary's College has an amazing musical tradition that continues to this day. All students in Year 7-9 learn a Band/Orchestra instrument for three years and play in an Ensemble. Students have one timetabled lesson a week, on Thursday morning and an additional half-hour group lesson with an Itinerant Teacher of Music. Extension/Senior Ensembles are available for students who can already play their instrument or want to continue playing past Year 9.



During Orientation morning new students are shown a range of instruments that are taught at St Mary's College. Students are asked to select their top 3 choices and most students get allocated their first choice of instrument.

Band Instruments are Flute, Clarinet, Saxophone, Trumpet, Percussion, Trombone, French Horn, Euphonium and Tuba.

String Instruments are Violin, Viola, Cello and Double Bass.

St Mary's does not teach piano or guitar as the teaching programme is based around the instruments listed above.

We advise your daughter to keep learning piano and guitar outside the St Mary's College programme, as well as learning a new instrument at St Mary's.

Students that already play the above instruments can create their own smaller ensembles from Year 7 and will be placed in an appropriate lesson group.

All Year 7 students sing together during the Thursday music period. In Year 8, students audition for a choir that runs during lunchtime. The Year 9 choir rehearse twice a week and performs throughout the year.

Students after Year 9 can choose to keep playing their instrument or sing in a choir and can continue with weekly lessons at St Mary's and become part of senior ensembles.

Your daughter will be allocated an instrument by the Music Department after orientation Day. An email will be sent to parents confirming instrument details. Confirmation will be sought if you have your own instrument or if you would like to hire one through the school.

If hiring an instrument, the fee will be added to your daughter's school account and the cost will appear on her main school invoice, which you receive each term. Hire instruments are handed out in week 4 of the new year.

HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Health and Physical Education is compulsory unless students are certified as medically unfit. Swimming is part of our school curriculum and all students are expected to participate. If your child is unable to participate in any lesson for medical reasons, please communicate with the Physical Education teacher over email or a written letter.



SPORTS

The College has a strong sporting tradition, and all students are encouraged to participate in at least one sport each year. The Director of Sport along with staff, parents and volunteers strive to offer a varied Sports program to cater for the different interests of our students. Students are expected to prioritise playing for the school while they are at the College. Parents are urged to support school teams and inter-school games.

A Sports Handbook is available which provides a brief outline of the different sports that are available at St Mary's. Whilst the Handbook aims to provide as much detail as possible, information can often change. Please use this resource as a guide to plan your daughter's sporting activities while attending St Mary's College.

THE NATIONAL CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT - NCEA

The New Zealand national qualification for secondary school students is the National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA).

Under NCEA students are assessed through a combination of examinations and internal assessment. In subjects where a written examination is not appropriate, such as Visual Arts Painting, assessment is by portfolio submission. Under NCEA students are also able to gain NCEA credits from standards developed by industry.

Each subject may offer between 16 and 24 credits, divided into individual Standards that can be worth between 2 and 14 credits each. There are two types of Standards - Achievement Standards and Unit Standards. Students gain results of Not Achieved, Achieved, Achieved with Merit or Achieved with Excellence for Achievement Standards. Results for Unit Standards are Achieved or Not Achieved, although some are now offered at Merit and Excellence levels. It is important to note that the annual NZQA Record of Achievement does not include Not Achieved results.

Course Endorsement

To enable students to gain a "Course Endorsement" in a subject, they must achieve at least 14 credits in that subject within the year. Of those 14 credits, there must be a minimum of 3 internally assessed credits and 3 externally assessed credits (Except Physical Education, Level 3 Visual Arts and Religious Education).

- To gain a "Course Endorsement" at Excellence level, students must achieve 14 or more credits at Excellence in that subject
- To gain a "Course Endorsement" at Merit level, students must achieve 14 or more credits at Merit (or a combination of Merit and Excellence) in that subject

Level Certificates

NCEA Level 1:

80 credits at Level 1 or above, including 10 credits in literacy and 10 credits in numeracy.

NCEA Level 2:

60 credits at Level 2 or above + 20 credits from any level

NCEA Level 3:

60 credits at Level 3 + 20 credits from Level 2 or above

NCEA Levels 1-3 Certificate Endorsement

If a student gains 50 credits at Excellence, over all the courses they are studying their Level Certificate will be endorsed with Excellence.

If a student gains 50 credits at Merit (or a combination of Merit and Excellence) over all the courses they are studying, their Level Certificate will be endorsed with Merit.

The purpose of these endorsements is to encourage students to strive to produce work of high quality and to recognise that achievement. This provides students with challenging but achievable goals.

NZQA Scholarship Exams

Students may enter to sit one or more Scholarship examinations as well as their Level 3 Standards. These examinations extend very able students and offer monetary awards ranging from one off payments of \$500 right up to \$10,000 each year for three years of tertiary study in New Zealand. Course material related to Level 3 subject courses is examined. However, the skills and understanding required to meet Scholarship criteria are considerably more advanced. Students are required to demonstrate highlevel abstract and critical thinking. Scholarship is not a qualification and does not generate credits towards NCEA. NCEA Review

In 2019 there was a review of NCEA by the Ministry of Education. Changes to NCEA Level 1 will be fully implemented by 2023. The full report on the year long review of NCEA can be read on the following link: http://www.conversation.education.govt.nz/conversations/ncea-review

Digital Assessment

Future State is the part of NZQA that is committed to developing the 21st Learners for the digital age. One branch of Future State is Moving to digital assessment - utilising new technologies to deliver assessments that reflect digitally supported teaching and learning, are available online and eventually available "anytime". To do this they are planning for all external assessments to be delivered digitally where appropriate.

St Mary's College has started to trial digital assessments in exam situations and students can expect to sit NCEA digitally within the next few years.

The diagram below represents the requirements of New Zealand University Entrance.

Please note: to gain selection into many university courses, your level of achievement needs to be well above the minimum requirement of University Entrance. Please check the website of the university you wish to attend for any additional requirements such as specified subjects/credits and rank scores.

University Entrance Using NCEA (has 4 components)

NUMERACY = 10 credits @ Level 1 or higher

from specified achievement standards available through a range of subjects

or

three numeracy unit standards (26623, 26626, 26627 – all three required)

LITERACY = 10 credits @ Level 2 or higher

from specified achievement standards available through a range of subjects

> 5 credits in READING from a specified list 5 credits in WRITING from a specified list

THREE APPROVED SUBJECTS

(Level 3 Credits achieved in Years 11 & 12 count towards University Entrance) minimum of 14 credits in one approved subject, minimum of 14 credits in second approved subject, minimum of 14 credits in third approved subject

ACHIEVE NCEA LEVEL 3 CERTIFICATE = 80 credits

(minimum of 60 credits @ Level 3 or higher+ 20 credits @ Level 2)

Credits from both Achievement and Unit Standards can be counted towards NCEA Level 3

Numeracy Requirements

The numeracy component for University Entrance (10 credits) is the same as the numeracy requirement for achieving NCEA Level 1, 2 & 3. The majority of students will complete this through their compulsory study of a Maths course at Year 11. Numeracy can be gained through other designated Achievement Standards from a range of subjects other than Maths.

Literacy Requirements

Literacy for University Entrance is set at Level 2 or higher. The University Entrance literacy component can be met through specified standards in a range of subjects at Level 2 or 3. The standards which qualify for University Entrance literacy (reading and/or writing) are shown in the subject pages of this booklet.

Please note: The University of Auckland has an Academic English Language Requirement (AELR) which may be met through gaining a minimum of 17 credits in English at level 2 or 3 OR through satisfactory completion of an approved course in your first 12 months of study at University of Auckland. Applicants who meet the UE Literacy Standard in Te Reo are exempt from meeting AELR.


